## Company sponsors disease monitoring equipment for needy families

SUN Life Malaysia Assurance Bhd has pledged to support Diabetes Malaysia for two years. patients to manage their sugar level during Ramadan as they run the risk of hypoglycae-mia if they do not consume appropriate food.

"They must also ensure that they don't over eat," Ooi added. He noted that the 2014 Sun Life Financial Asia's Health Index revealed the emergence

of Generation O – a demographic that is over-worked, overstressed, overwhelmed and overeats as well.

"Such behaviour will lead to a higher possi-bility of medical complications later in life," Ooi said.

Sun Life Malaysia is subsidising the quar-

terly provision of monitoring equipment terry provision of monitoring equipment which include test strips, pen needles, lancets and glucose meters to 240 underprivileged patients across the country.

Every quarter, staff volunteers will help pack the equipment into personalised boxes which will be distributed to the recipients.
