FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Market Review

During the month, the Malaysian Government Securities (MGS) yield curve bull steepened as yields on the short end up to 20-year moved lower by 4 to 15bps whilst the more than 20-year maturities rose higher by 6 to 16 bps. In general, the rally from prior month continued albeit on a milder scale. Better local and global sentiment was seen as there was better clarity seen for domestic politics and US inflation fears eased albeit some volatility continued to be seen throughout the month. The 3-, 5-, 7-, 10-, 15-, 20- and 30-year MGS yields closed at 3.73% (-15bps), 3.87% (-7bps), 4.01% (-5bps), 4.07% (-7bps), 4.29% (-12bps), 4.41% (-4bps) and 4.70% (+16bps) respectively at the end of December.

Based on the 2023 government budget tabled in October, there is a projected RM180 billions of gross supply (annual increase of 4.98%) taking into consideration maturity of RM80.9 billion and a deficit of RM99.0 billion. The projection will likely change should there be a change for the deficit amount after the new government re-tables Budget 2023 on 24 February 2023.

Based on earlier projections, government bond auctions are likely to be slightly front loaded slightly with 51% targeted in 1H2023. Looking at the net issuances, 3Q2023 will see the highest supply of RM29 billion while 2Q2023 lowest. There will be RM80.9 billion maturity in 2023 (2022: RM78.9 billion) with the bulk of the maturity amounting to RM65.4 billion (81%) between the months of March to August 2023.

The strong rally in November which saw MGS yields easing by 23 to 70bps largely continued in the month of December, albeit at a milder pace. For the MGS curve, all tenors lowered between 4 to 15bps with the 3-year rallying the most as it closed at 3.73%. Meanwhile, the 30-year which had rallied by 49bps in November, pared down its gains slightly as it closed 16bps higher by month end. The front to belly of the curve continued to give a pickup against OPR of +98bps, +112bps and +126bps against OPR which is higher than the 5-year average historical mean.



FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS (CONTINUED)

In December, credit spreads mostly tightened for the AAA and AA rating band between 7 to 14bps, save for the 3-year tenor which widened slightly by 3bps for the AA rating bucket. Meanwhile, for the single-A rating band, spreads widened by 1 to 10bps for all tenors.

Outlook & Strategy

We believe local markets are observing closely the upcoming re-tabling of Budget 2023 which will be held on 24 February 2023. Main catalyst for the bond market would be the updated projected deficit figure. We are watchful for opportunities to trade local government securities as we believe flows will continue to be positive for the market. We aim to gradually add some position in the longer end of the curve to anchor our returns for the year. Although we continue to remain overweight in corporates, we are mindful of the potential slowdown in growth for certain sectors in the economy and as such, we would prefer names with a stronger credit profile.
