PERFORMANCE RECORD

The Fund feeds into AHAM Select Asia (ex Japan) Quantum Fund ("target fund") with the objective of achieving capital appreciation over the medium to long-term by investing in Asia (ex Japan) equities with market capitalization of not more than USD1.5 billion at the time of investment. However, the target fund would also have an option to invest into companies with a market capitalization of not more than USD3.0 billion at the time of investment, which will be capped at no more than 30% of the Net Asset Value (NAV) of the target fund.

Table below shows the investment returns of Sun Life Malaysia Select Asia (ex Japan) Quantum Fund versus its benchmark as at 30 August 2023:

FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

- In Asia, the MSCI Asia ex-Japan slid 6.61% with most of the region in the red as rising bond yields put pressure on emerging markets. Taiwan and Korea's country index fell by 2.98% and 2.90% respectively. Though, China bore the brunt of losses with the MSCI China index down by 8.50% as investors remain doubtful whether the stimulus measures would not be enough to arrest the decline in growth.
- The country's securities regulator introduced a set of initiatives to revitalise the stock market including lowering the
 costs of trading as well as a proposal to extend trading hours. China also introduced a volley of measures aimed at its
 beleaguered property sector including lowering the minimum downpayment requirements as well as easing mortgage
 rules in several major tier 1 cities.
- While these measures should help to stem a deepening rout in China's property sector, more needs to be done address the demand-side to kick start home buying appetite. The forthcoming GDP data release could hold key significance as a weaker than expected performance could potentially prompt Beijing to roll out much stronger stimulus measures to meets its 2023 economic target.
- Back home, the local market held steady with the benchmark KLCI barely unchanged at -0.51% in August. There was
 greater political clarity following the conclusion of state elections. As widely expected, the Pakatan Harapan-Barisan
 Nasional (PH-BN) coalition retained Selangor, Penang and Negeri Sembilan, while Perikatan Nasional (PN) held on to
 their strongholds in Kedah, Kelantan and Terengganu.

STRATEGY:

- While Asian markets were weak in August, nonetheless Korea and Taiwan is outperforming year-to-date (YTD) due to
 expectations of the ending of the cyclical downturn in the semiconductor sector. Companies with exposure to AI are
 also rerating. India and Indonesia outperformed driven by robust domestic economy, as household leverage is lowest
 in the region. Thailand outperformed in August as political uncertainty ended. China's economic momentum has been
 weak. Sentiment remains fragile. More concrete measures are required.
- On a YTD basis, the fund returned 0.9%, lagging the benchmark due to its initial underweight in countries such as India, Taiwan and Korea which have outperformed, while overweighting HK/China which underperformed.
- The Fund continues to maintain positioning for earnings recovery. HK and China poses a mixed trend. Structural growth sectors are expected to meet earnings expectations, while the consumption related sectors will be dependent on effectiveness of stimulus measures.
