

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FUND MANAGER’S COMMENTS

The Fund declined 5.49% during the month, underperformed the benchmark by 3.65%.

Global equities collectively declined in February 2025 after starting the year on a strong note. Amid investor concerns about US economic growth and President Donald Trump’s tariff plans, US stocks retreated and pulled developed market stocks and the broader global equity market lower. On the economic front, global manufacturing activity expanded in February for the second consecutive month, and flash reports showed global services activity growing in several regions.

The information technology (IT) sector remained in negative territory through February with IT services faring worst of all and communication services sector fared worse than IT. Fresh inflation data also stoked unease about higher interest rates, which tend to negatively impact growth stocks like those in the IT sector. The US government announced new tariffs on imports. The new tariffs added to uncertainty and were widely seen as a source of increased costs for technology-focused companies reliant on global supply chains.

Despite recent equity market volatility, we still expect a generally favorable market backdrop to emerge in 2025. Stable monetary policy, potential deregulation, and AI-driven productivity gains could add to a generally healthy economic picture in the United States.
